Siblings: "The forgotten mourners." Often called "The Forgotten Mourners", siblings may sometimes become overlooked when parents are dealing with the death of a child. This month we will start the meeting by talking about some of the issues that siblings have to deal with after the death of a sister or brother. This edition of the newsletter will share articles written by siblings in the hopes that parents can better understand sibling's feelings that are often censored in the belief that sharing will worsen our pain.

After the devastating loss of a child, parents are so consumed with their own grief that they may not fully understand what their surviving children are going through. Depending on the age of the surviving children, a variety of issues will have to be met.

Bereaved siblings often focus on the needs of their parents and fail to focus on their own needs. This meeting will examine some of those needs and provide practical guidelines for parents to help their children through the grief process. We will also examine the special needs of parents with no surviving children.

No matter what age your surviving children are, their reactions and support they are able to give and to receive are often magnified by the way we, as bereaved parents, respond. Join us as we share ways to help each other through this difficult time.

Letter to Parents of The Compassionate Friends

Dear Parents:

I am writing to let you know how I feel and maybe how some of the other siblings feel. There have been times when my parents start really getting extra down about my brother. I usually leave the room. I feel that no matter how hard I try, I will say or do something that will hurt them more, or that they won't understand what I'm really trying to say. They already feel enough pain. I really love them and I understand enough about how they hurt, but I'm just not good at saying what I feel. It seems like it never sounds right.

I also hold my emotions back from them. I always hear it is best to let it out, and I do, but not in front of my parents. I'm afraid they might try to hold their emotions back in front of me, so I won't get upset. I've had rough times for the past couple

of years. And I'm still having hard times, so I'm always afraid they will hold it back. I love to talk about good times my brother and I have, but I'd just rather be alone when I cry for him. Just once in a while my sister and I can talk about him, but that's the only person I can really talk to.

I hope and pray with all my heart that my parents will understand, but I just can't talk to them. I miss my brother a lot, more than I think they really realize. I love and care for them, too much to go and upset them even more. Maybe I'm wrong, but please parents, understand how I feel. May we always be close.

For Siblings -- What about Me?

Have you ever felt that, as a surviving sister sister or brother, that we are often forgotten?

I have felt this way quite often in the last

six years. Over time, the feeling becomes less and less.

When a parent loses a child, they are the ones that immediately come to mind. I am not trying to slight the pain they feel by any means, but we, as siblings, are often swept to the side. Our parents' grief is so much different than ours is. No more or less hurtful than ours, but different. They lost their child. I hope that in my lifetime, I never have to know how that feels.

I know how painful it was for me when Sean died; I don't want to know the pains of having a child die. But often at times, we are the "Forgotten Mourners".

I love my brother very much and miss him just as much. I think that people sometimes forget that we are hurting also. My parents were offenders of that too. I know that they knew my sister and I were hurting, but they were so wrapped up in what they were feeling, that they didn't have time to worry about what my sister and I were feeling.

I tried so hard to make my parents well again that I neglected my grief. Pretty much denied it. We really want to make our families "normal" again.

I have had some awful things said to me over the last six years. Two weeks after Sean died, someone said to me, "Well, you do still have a sister." Well yes, I do still have a sister, but that still doesn't lessen the pain of my brother's death and my sister can't possibly replace my brother. Probably the worst thing anyone has said to me is "Why aren't you over this? Sean's been dead six months." Well, it's not something you just "get over!" I have learned a lot of things over the years and if I hadn't been in such a state of shock, maybe I would have had some of those responses. When I think back on it, I wish I had.

I have decided that from what I have learned, I need to educate people and make them understand that siblings and friends have the right to grieve, too. As surviving siblings and friends we also have to realize that we need to find a new "normal". We also need to know that it's okay to feel all of the things that we feel, be it anger, sadness, guilt, or any other emotion that we may have. Just know that you're not crazy or wrong to grieve. Know also that it is alright to think and talk about them when you're ready. Not when someone else says or thinks you should be ready. Death and grieving is, unfortunately, a part of life. --By: Traci Morlock St. Louis, MO

Teen Sharing

A rush of pure, intense pain and sorrow invaded my body shattering my heart. I no longer felt my body and had no reason to keep on living. Through swollen eyes, I saw nothing and the only thing I could screech was, "I want my sister." But, she had died. I loved my sister so much that words aren't nearly enough, but I will try to share with you the pain my family experienced through her death, some memories, and how I feel today.

It happened on October 9, 1993, early one morning when my sister, Jennifer, was on her way to school. On the road going to and from my house there is an awful uphill curve where she struck another vehicle head on. She was the only one injured. A sheriff awoke my mother and me to inform us of the wreck. He suggested we rush to the hospital but gave us no details. At that moment I did not know what profound effect this event would have on my life because I thought she was alright. I prayed to God she was alright.

However, her funeral was October 12, what would have been her 19th birthday. By now, I was a complete and total waste, nothing but a zombie. Swarms of people surrounded my family for a week and I felt as if they were all strangers to me. People kept saying, "I'm sorry," because they felt so awkward, but I was the one who felt awkward! Some told me to quit holding back and to just cry.

You know how people say, "I'm so happy I could cry," well, sometimes you are so sad you can't. I was in a state of mental shock. I had to be strong for my mom and dad; it hit them so hard I literally watched them age.

It doesn't seem fair, today I have lived over a year longer than Jennifer, and she was originally three years older than me. I wonder where we would be now. If we would both still live at home, or decided to move out and into an apartment together, or perhaps she would have married and started a family.

Sometimes I feel like I'm forgetting, but then her favorite song will play or a friend, to both Jennifer and I, will tell a story of a time we spent together. The memories are still alive and my family still lives in the same house – a house that I have grown to appreciate because I can look down the hallway and see the two of us racing cars or sit on our back porch and picture all the fun we had making mud pies. She never escapes my mind. The simplicity of a cloud in the sky can bring her presence upon me. Friends and family have told us they have home movies of us but I still can't watch them. If I actually heard her voice, I would lose it. But, with time, it does get easier.

Nothing is comparable to losing a sibling who once lived in your house right in the next room. Today, my family is still hanging in there. We realize how precious her time with us was and try to make our time here last. We are together and hold Jennifer's memory strong. I know it was God's plan even though it seems so unfair. I realize that nothing could have changed it and that she is happier now watching over us giving us strength. She inspired me to be my unique individual self and I am proud of who I am today.

The sorrow my family felt can never be described, though the memories we hold and the bonds that connect us, I believe that we will always return to our roots. A bereaved Sibling wrote...

Siblings have to remember that their parents are so consumed by grief that they may not be able to worry about you. Don't feel that they don't

love you, they do, but their grief is so strong that it is controlling them. Sometimes you feel you are lost in the shuffle. You are hurting and everyone is telling you to be strong and you keep saying to yourself, "What about me?"

The demand for TCF programs continues to grow as grief-related problems are recognized. The death of a sibling, however, is one of the most traumatic and least understood life crises. Adolescence is a particularly vulnerable period in which to experience such a loss. Bereaved teenagers and young adults must cope with normal developmental tasks at a time when the entire family is in crisis.

The attention and concern of family members and friends often centers on the bereaved parents. Surviving children are frequently referred to as the "forgotten mourners." They are encouraged by others to be strong for their parents and are often told they are young and therefore will get over the loss. As a result, children are offered a multitude of so-called comforting cliches' rather than the necessary information they need to mourn effectively and eventually to reach a satisfactory resolution of their grief.

That's what families are supposed to do - lighten each other's burdens. Let us bury our dead together, and keep our memories of them and express them often, but we must get on with our lives now.

Parents, we must live for our living children show our love for them, lest they feel unwanted and lose heart.

Understanding Children and Grief

The following article was printed in the newsletter for the Greater L.A. Area SIDS Alliance, which they adapted from a series in Bereavement Magazine. It seeks to dispel 10 COMMON MYTHS ABOUT CHILDREN AND GRIEF.

Myth 1 - Grief and mourning are the same experience. Grief is the internal meaning given to the experience of bereavement. Children, like adults, experience this emotion. Mourning is taking the internal experience of grief and displaying it outwardly. Hence, like an adult a child can be experiencing grief but not showing it outwardly.

Myth 2 - A child's mourning and grief are short in duration. Grief and mourning are a process, not an event. A child cannot "get over" it like he can a broken toy or a minor injury. Actually, it is healthy to see some more visible signs of outward mourning six months or more after the child experiences death.

Myth 3 - A child's experience of grief is predictable and orderly. Adults tend to take reading about stages of grief too literally and expect children to grieve in a certain progression. A variety of unique thoughts, feelings, and behaviors will be experienced as part of the healing process. Adults should not expect children to follow a regimen in their grief, but should, instead, allow children to teach them where they are in the process.

Myth 4 - Infants and toddlers are too young to grieve or mourn. A child old enough to love is old enough to grieve and mourn. Children, particularly when they are very young, may not understand loss. It is not uncommon to see sleep disturbances and explosive emotions in infants

and toddlers after the death of a loved one. Unless an adult supports and nurtures very young children, they can potentially develop a lack of trust. Holding, hugging, and playing with them are the primary ways to help.

Myth 5 - A grieving adult does not have any impact on children. Adults may attempt to conceal their grief and mourning around a child. Modeling is a primary way by which children learn. If adults hide the grieving process, they teach children to do the same.

Myth 6 – Experiencing bereavement during childhood will always lead to a maladjusted adulthood. Old theories about a relationship between childhood bereavement and "mental illness" are no longer in vogue. Instead, the quality of support and care given to bereaved children as they grieve is a major influence on the healing.

Myth 7 - Children shouldn't go to funerals. Forbidding a child's attendance at the funeral of a loved one denies him the opportunity to confront the reality of death with the support of loving adults. Since a funeral is a significant event, children should always be encouraged to attend, but never forced. A funeral may provide a chance for children to express their unique relationship with their brother or sister by including their own rituals in the service.

Myth 8 – Allowing children to cry will make them weak; it is harmful in the long run. Children will repress tears if adults demand it, or they see adults around them doing the same. Adults who counsel children not to cry, or to "be strong", often cannot deal with the helplessness of seeing children cry. This defeats the natural purpose of crying: to release internal tension in the body and communicate a need to be comforted.

Myth 9 – Adults should explain death to children in simplified terms. Telling children that a loved one has "gone to live in heaven" will not appease them. Instead, an adult should attempt to clarify abstract ideas about death by patiently answering the child's questions honestly and gently. A child often will become confused about the ceremonies and the perceived realities of death.

Myth 10 - Adults should help children "get over" grief and mourning. This sort of attitude often reflects an adult's loss of patience or discomfort with a child's mourning. As is true with adults, children never "get over" the loss of a loved

one; rather, it is hoped they become reconciled to it.

An Only Child

Parents and the only child learn to adapt in the multi-child culture. Family members, friends, school and the community at large assume that an only child is not normal therefore, something must be wrong or at least could be improved.

The years of Kari's life taught us to do the best we could each day. All of her life, we encouraged her to do her best, because it is important to have a deep self-satisfaction of a job well done.

After the sudden auto accident that claimed her life and in our deepest grief we received some strength from the values we had seen in her life. I did not feel that I was alone in the world without my only child. I felt as if I did not want to live without my child, not that she was my only child. Perhaps the fact that parents of other children who have also died and had other surviving children felt they were not able to live without their precious children either, helped us to understand no child can be replaced.

Again, the community came assuming that you could not survive the death of an only child, just as you could not have normalcy with an only child in life. Many freely gave suggestions ranging from you should move, to adoption (had we been younger, I am sure the advice would have been to have another baby) and other well meaning, misguided advice.

We remembered our numerous encouragements that we had given Kari, we do not live alone in the world: our pain is no greater, we are no different from any parent whose child has died.

There are actually some blessings to not having other children in the household. What little energy you have can be spent on your own grief work and not worrying about what you need to do to help surviving children. Parents with surviving children have a blessing. They also have the awesome task of helping surviving siblings understand issues of life and death. Not a topic most parents plan on teaching. Without this distraction parents grieving the death of an only child can spend uninterrupted time toward healing.

The death of an only child does tend to exclude the parents from most family events. They

will never experience grandparenting, weddings, holidays and all the other family oriented gatherings. This leaves a very "left out" feeling in conversations, knowing they will never get to experience these special times.

Each parent that experiences the death of a child, no matter the age or cause, has not had a choice in the event. It does not matter if we have multiple children or only the one child, we love each one and could not make a choice. We each have a difficult time in learning to live again after the death of our child.

We do heal. We do learn to live again. We are not the same person as we were before but in time each will find a new normal. Patience to let time and grief work to help us heal is the path to knowing we will survive.

What Time Is It?

The dreary days of January and February are past us, the end-of-the-year holidays are fading in memory, and we prepare to sit down and take a "breather." After all, that's exactly what we've lost - continuation. And instead of feelings of rebirth and hope, we may be feeling extremely mortal and vulnerable.

As difficult as these feelings can be for us, our faith training may help us to reach up and out of the despondency. Old habits of celebration of spring's renewals may help us pass the critical

moments until we can breathe again without so much pain.

For some, though, and I confess I am one of them, the worst time in these early spring months is not the holidays, but rather the return to daylight saving time. Now why would something like that cause pain for a bereaved parent or sibling? Well, for me, it's because it represents the time when my son would begin to pursue his outdoor activities - rock climbing, water sports, camping. These were his happiest times, the hours spent in pursuit of his enjoyment with his friends around to share it. Not that he didn't have fun in winter! He loved the winter. But he felt more alive in the spring and summer - he had more time (in his mind, anyway) each day to do the things he wanted.

So, now when I hear the dreaded phrase, "Spring forward; Fall back," I'm reminded all over again of my loss. The only "springing forward" for me is into memories.

Waves of memories and emotions will pound us a bit more fiercely as my wife and I, and family and friends remember:

A beautiful baby girl

A social toddler on her brother's Big Wheel A strong-willed middle child, always checking to see if the rules had changed

An ice skater and a cheerleader

A faithful sister and friend

A college graduate

A radiant bride

A 24-year-old young woman eagerly looking forward to her first full-time job that would start the next day...

On Sunday afternoon, March 17, our daughter left her part-time job as hostess at a diner in Brooklyn Center and headed south on Highway 100 for a dinner with her husband and in-laws to celebrate the new job. At a busy intersection, under construction at that time, she was involved in a tragic car accident. She died in the ambulance en route to the hospital. Tomorrow is the eighth anniversary of Melissa Ann (Dahlmeier) Roeser's death. It seems like forever, but it is just an eye-

blink in eternity... So enjoy them while they're here. These chocolate and mint-frosted brownies were one of her favorites. They remind me of life...bitter mixed with sweet and sometimes a little nuts.

The Aftermath of Suicide

I had never experienced the death of a close loved one before my brother died. When David died, my world came crashing down around me, shattering me into a million pieces. My brother and I were close, but I had no suspicion that he was contemplating suicide and had been for a long time. The night my sister called to tell me he was dead is etched in my memory forever. If I shut my eyes, I can go back to that time and place almost three years ago and still hear her voice. It is a very painful memory, and one that I don't call up, but it is there nonetheless.

The overwhelming feelings of shock, disbelief, numbness, despair, and sadness are very vivid. At the same time, I was outraged at what he had done to us, and to me. How dare he do this! I couldn't even begin to guess how many times I said, "I can't believe this is happening."

The first six months were a confusing and emotionally draining period for me. I was obsessed with wanting to have answers, especially from him. I read many books on suicide and finally, after reading Iris Bolton's book, MY SON... MY SON, I came to realize what she said was true: "You can ask 'why' a million times but you finally have to let it go because the person you need the answers from is not here to give them to you. If only for the sake of your own sanity, you have to stop asking 'why'!"

Our family drew closer together from this tragedy, and it made me more aware of how much I value and love them. I also had the support of a good friend who was willing to spend hours talking and crying with me. I still get very angry at my brother for changing our lives so irrevocably. That anger inevitably turns into sadness. I cannot see his smiling face, or

hear his laughter, or watch him grow into adulthood. Yes, I had dreams for him, too. He was an intelligent, warm, sensitive, and caring young man, and I was eager to see what direction his life would take. I can't help but wonder what he would be like today. I miss him very much.

I will never agree with his solution, but it was his choice to make. I have to learn to live with it. I am absolutely certain beyond a shadow of a doubt that I will see him again. Only then will I get answers to my questions. I have no choice but to wait until that time.

Newly Bereaved...

Letting Go Of Guilt

Quite often, the first feelings that overtake a mother or father following the death of a child are feelings of extreme guilt. Thoughts of "if only" seem to relentlessly keep returning. "If only" I had taken her to the doctor sooner. "If only" I had not given him the car keys when I knew the roads were icy. "If only" I had not turned my back to

answer the phone. "If only" I had not left him playing alone in the bathtub. Guilt is such a heavy burden of grief to carry around!

How does a parent move beyond the guilt of losing a child? How can a parent shed the painful feelings of inadequacy? How does a parent ever find a way to let go of the guilt?

The most difficult step in releasing the tight clutch that guilt holds on a parent's heart is dealing with the reality of the loss. "My child died" are often the most difficult three words that will ever come from the mouth of a parent. Those words are hard words, yet they are words that are necessary to say and to understand, before being able to rid oneself of guilt.

When we live in an "if only" emotional environment, we have not yet come to the full realization that child loss has actually occurred. We are still working through the mental "if only" reasoning which continues to wreak havoc on a parent's heart. When a parent lives in an "if only" state, the reality of the child's death can never be completely accepted. As painful as it is, a parent must, at some point-make the hard choice to accept the reality that the child has died.

Because a parent's primary role is to nurture and care for the child, a parent often has a feeling of deserving punishment when a child dies. That is simply another way of expressing the heaviness of guilt. A parent often wrestles with the thought that "because my child died, I do not deserve to ever smile again". Guilt continues to prevent many parents from moving forward in this difficult journey we call grief.

It takes a lot of concentrated effort, hard work, and support from others to be able to forgive oneself and finally let go of the gnawing feeling of guilt following the death of a child. Until a parent makes the decision to leave the heavy weight of guilt behind, joy can never return to a heart that has been so deeply wounded by the loss of a child.

Letting go of guilt is a decision that must be made. There is no timetable for making that decision, and others cannot force that decision on any parent. Eventually, a parent will come to the realization that the child's death is real, and there is a hard choice to be made- to continue to live in the guilt of the loss, or to let go of that heaviness of guilt and begin to experience a bit of peace and joy once again.

Letting go of guilt requires a real effort to put an end to the "if only" questions. Letting go of guilt means that a parent no longer blames himself for the death of the child. Letting go of guilt means forgiving oneself and accepting oneself. Letting go of guilt means being gentle with oneself and allowing time for healing to take place.

Letting go of guilt is one of the most difficult parts of grief work. It takes a lot of energy, understanding, and patience. But, when guilt is finally set free, a parent's heart can begin to walk the journey of healing through child loss.

The Path

My world lay shattered around me. Gone were the flowers and the sun. The path ahead looked dark and threatening. I heard a voice saying, "You have to travel this path alone." "I don't want to go down that path. I can't." I protested. "I liked the old path."

"The choice is yours," said the voice, "but you may never go back to the old path. You may stay at the crossroads where anger and pain will keep you company and wither your spirit. Or you may run off into the surrounding woods and pretend you are going somewhere, but you will become disoriented and lost. The only peace to be found is at the end of the path ahead."

"If you have the courage to set forth upon the new path and keep struggling through the storms,

you will discover depths within yourself that you never knew existed. If you reach out you will find those who have already traveled this difficult way and are there to support and guide you. Though it seems impossible now, your path will become beautiful again, as will your spirit. You will emerge from desolation a stronger, wiser, and more compassionate person. Then you, too, can turn and extend your hand to those who are still on the way."

I made my choice. I picked up the remains of my life ... my aching heart and wounded spirit, my broken dreams and disbeliefs, and wrapped them carefully in my blanket of grief. Holding them closely to me, I wailed steadfastly ahead into the storm with faith in the promise of the peace on the other side.



For Siblings...

Ask Dr. Paulson Mary A. Paulson, PhD, is a bereaved sibling as well as a child and adolescent psychologist at Harding Hospital in Worthington, Ohio. Her question and answer column, aimed at bereaved siblings and the family that loves them. appears in the quarterly TCF national magazine, We Need Not Walk Alone.

Q. I am 35 years old and my only brother passed away this past May at age 27. It was a sudden death—he wasn't physically sick—he was found by my mom in his room on the floor. I haven't had any bereavement counseling for the loss of my brother, but I have been reading lots of books. I have lost others close to me grandparents, friends—but the loss of my brother has just crushed my whole world. I have good days when I can talk about him without breaking down, but on other days I think of him and can't control my tears. The loss of my brother was very devastating to all of us, my parents as well as me. Since I'm the oldest and now the only child, I feel it is my duly to take care of my parents, and if I don't, then I'm a bad daughter. However, I've been scolded by my best friend that I need to take care of myself as well. How do I continue to do that without feeling selfish and disloyal to my parents or my brother?

A. Once tragedy strikes, the family unit begins to function differently. Although you have always been the oldest child, your

world has now made a big shift to being an only child. Your tears demonstrate the depth of relationship you shared with your brother, and that relationship doesn't end. As time passes, you'll notice you have more "good days," when you think of the good times and smile at your memories. You can't share the day-to-day experiences with him, but he will always be your brother. You will always be the person who grew up as his older sister—the person you became by knowing him, caring for him, playing with him, and loving him; That doesn't ever stop or end. You are not being disloyal to him for having good days. I believe he would still want you to have as much comfort, joy, and laughter in your life as possible—even though he cannot be the source now. Part of caring for yourself is allowing yourself to experience the good days as well as those days when you realize how much you miss him. At the same time, it sounds like you have a desire to share time with your parents too. This doesn't mean you need to become responsible for their moods or emotional well-being. Instead, take the opportunity to share yourself, your love, and your family connections with your parents. Establish a new, stronger, more supportive, and loving relationship with the family that has loved you and grown with you through all the ups and downs thus far in your life.

When a Brother or Sister Dies

Johnny was seven at the time his older brother, Charlie, died. Johnny couldn't understand all the sadness that was swirling around him. He tried to put it into words; "My parents don't seem to care about me. All they talk about is Charlie. They look so sad all the time. I wonder how they really feel about me. My dad used to take us fishing with him. A few days ago, I tried to get him to take me, but he wouldn't. I guess he really only cared about going with Charlie all along."

If we adults do not understand death, how much more difficult is it for a child? Irrational thoughts and fears abound for adults and children alike, but especially for children. They are flooded with frightening thoughts. Was it my fault? Will it happen to me? Will my mother leave me too? My father? How often are our children surrounded by guilt or shame – they have survived and their brother or sister has not.

Although parents may be guilty of ignoring their surviving children, more frequently, they become overprotective. The fear of another loss

is so strong they want to control everything the child does in order to assure his safety. This leads to a double resentment. The overprotected child feels that his freedom has been taken away, and in turn, represents the brother or sister who "caused" this to happen. Of course, this resentment leads to more guilt, more self-recrimination.

Is it surprising that a surviving brother or sister will try to please the parent by trying to take the place of the one the parents loved so deeply? These survivors want their parents' sadness to stop. One way is to symbolically become the deceased child so that the parents will not miss him so much. Mark had always worn a baseball cap. His brother, T. J., never did. But in the days after Mark died, T.J. went to the closet and took out Mark's old baseball cap and started to wear it. Not only was T.J. grieving the brother that he missed so much, but he was also telling his parents that he could take his brother's place. --Excerpted from Facing The Ultimate Loss by Robert J. For Grandparents...



Grandparents-grief

From the moment you became a parent yourself, you have sought to protect your child from the pain and sorrows of life. Mostly, you have been successful. You've had the ability to solve problems and the power to lessen hurts. Suddenly your adult child is facing a pain far deeper than any other pain in life. It may be deeper than anything that you have ever experienced, or perhaps you can understand this sorrow because you, too, have lost a child. Either way, you are now experiencing a variety of emotions: helplessness, frustration, grief, guilt and anger.

Double Grief: You are grieving for your grandchild. All your hopes and dreams have been shattered and your promise of immortality has been broken. You had wondered if he or she would favor your side of the family, wondered what he would become and had perhaps even bought gifts for later on (like a first tricycle or special doll.)

While your grief may not be recognized by your own child, you are, most definitely, entitled to it. Grandparents are often referred to as the

forgotten grievers. You were looking forward to a special relationship with your grandchild, one of unconditional love unhampered by parental responsibility.

All the little ways that you had to coax a smile from your child are useless. Now all the magic words that used to solve the problems are empty. You can only sit by, offer support and watch your adult child learn to live with this loss.

Grandparents often feel that they should cope better, have all the answers, control the situation and be an example. When all that you have offered (advice, financial aid, babysitting or experience) is not accepted, asked for, or is even rejected, grandparents feel guilt, frustration and anger.

A sudden death of a baby, whether during pregnancy or after birth, is uniquely difficult because of its very nature. Its suddenness and the lack of answers to important questions intensify the grief reactions. As grandparents, understanding what is known about your grandchild's cause of death is vitally important.

Support: Talking with other bereaved grandparents may help. First Candle can help put you in touch with other grandparents who have experienced a similar death by calling 1-800-221-7437. You can also contact AGAST (Alliance of Grandparents, A Support in Tragedy).

Elephants were my daughter Andrea's favorite. Wherever we traveled, we brought back a little elephant souvenir. She arranged them all in her room. One day they were joined by a big picture of a sunflower. "I just love this picture," Andrea said as she hung it over her bed. "It reminds me of the sun even when I'm indoors." I didn't need a flower to remind me. Andrea was my sunshine.

When she died at 19 in a boating accident, I

felt like she took all the warmth in my life with her. On the five- year anniversary, I visited the river where she died. "Lord, let me feel that warmth again," I prayed as I looked out over the water. I wandered into the near- by town. Walking past a shop window, my eyes fell upon a little elephant. Andrea would love this, I thought. But what was that in its trunk? A sunflower! A plaque at the base of the statue read:

"You Are My Sunshine."

For the first time since Andrea's death, I felt warm. "Thank you, Lord," I whispered. The statue now sits on my bedside table. It reminds me that the sunshine-like Andrea-will always be with me.

Please try attending three meetings before deciding if TCF is for you. Each meeting is different, and the next one might be the one that really helps.

We encourage you to take advantage of our resources. We have a well stocked library of grief materials, a phone friend committee that welcomes calls at any time, and a members' directory to call another parent you have met at the meetings.

Thank You ... Thank you to all those who donate to our meeting basket or send donations to our chapter. Since there are no fees or dues to belong to TCF. your donations keep us functioning, and we appreciate your help.

Birthday Tributes... During your child's birthday month, you may place a picture and either a short personal message, poem, or story about your child in the newsletter. (Less than 200 words, please.) Do not cut your picture. We will block off unused areas. If it is a group photo, identify the person to be cropped. This tribute is an opportunity to tell a short story about your child, so we will be able to know them better. Photos must have identification on the back. Enclose a SASE in order for photos to be returned by mail. (Please do not send your only picture.)

Tributes must be in by the 1st of the month preceding your child's birthday month or at the prior meeting. (Example: Jan.1st for Feb. birthdays). Otherwise they will appear if space permits or in the following month's issue.
