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**April 4th meeting ...** This month our topic will be "Grief and Family Members". How do you focus on your remaining family members and their grief following the death of your child? All your energies seem to be needed for your own survival. This meeting we will start by talking about what we can do to help our extended families and close friends while meeting our own needs. Surviving sibling, grandparents and close friends are all wanting to help us during this painful time. Each of these groups go about it in different ways...sometimes doing the "wrong" things for the "right" reasons.

First we will look at how they may be affected by their own loss and then talk about ways we can try and help them when we are already on overload. We invite you to join us as we share ways to help our extended families.

### A View From A Parent's Heart

When I began working with a children's grief group, I was reawakened to the fact that young people are many times forgotten in the midst of grief. Their feelings and pain are often put on the back burner until we can emotionally deal with them ourselves.

I found myself going back to the time when my daughter died, and wondering if I had given enough attention to my surviving three children in their own grief. As a grieving parent, I might have neglected at times to include these "forgotten mourners" in my sadness and pain. I hoped that I had given their grief the attention it so desperately needed.

Grieving children need to be allowed to mourn with us and among us. They need to share our pain and work through the myriad of feelings they are encountering. They will most likely bottle those feelings up inside, never knowing exactly what to do with them. Parents, share your grief with your children. They need to know it is a normal occurrence following the death of a loved one. Allow them to share their feelings, even when you believe it may be difficult, or your own pain is overwhelming you.

They are hurting too. Yes, it will be hard, but they will benefit from it. These "forgotten mourners" come to my grief group confused and in pain because they have not been able to grieve the loss of a loved one. Talking about

their feelings, shedding tears, and realizing that things will be better can make a world of difference for them.

Almost sounds like any grieving adult doesn't it? I guess we just have to remember these children are feeling the same things we are, only in smaller bodies. But they have big hearts and big hugs! So, share your grief today with your children. Make them an important part of your grieving process. You'll both be better for it!

### A Grandparent's Lament



My seven-year-old grandchild was killed in a tragic accident. We had such wonderful times together. He was the shining light of my life. And now he is gone. I feel sorry for my daughter and son-in-law, but they have lots of support from caring friends. No one seems to understand my agony. Grandparents mourn too!

**Rabbi Grollman responds:** How true. The grandparent/grandchild relationship is very special. With quality time they provide the biggest laps, make few demands, and give many gifts. It has often been said that parents aren't supposed to bury their children. But neither are grandparents supposed to bury their grandchildren. When a child dies, both parents and grandparents have lost a part of their future—one of the most horrific blows that human beings can endure.

There is the double assault of grieving for a grandchild while witnessing the suffering of your daughter and son-in-law. Your grief work may be different. Memories and attachments are not the same.

Each of you has been rocked in individual paths to the very depths of your being in the attempt to patch together the pieces of your shattered lives. You must find a way to express what you are feeling or this suffering will stay inside you and fester. Seek out those with whom you can share your heartbreak. Pour out these emotions of grief and if necessary repeat them time and time again.

Perhaps keep a journal for your eyes alone to flood out your sorrow. But most of all, talk. Talk to your friends, family, clergy, neighbors, support group or a professional counselor. How sorely you need their expressions of help, warmth and

understanding.

The death of your grandchild may also result in an even closer relationship with your daughter, son-in-law, and the rest of your family. Recall the unforgettable memories of the past as you search for a meaningful future. Even in your overwhelming despair, you will realize that part of that child's life will live with you forever.

## A Family Copes With Tragedy

Most people think that after a reasonable period of mourning, families pick up the pieces of their lives and go on. I remember a friend asking me, three months after my son's death, if everything was back to normal. Those who haven't been through this experience cannot comprehend that life, as we know it will never exist again. There won't be "normal" years for parents whose world has been devastated. Their dreams of raising children have vanished forever.

Our surviving children have lost a part of themselves—the part they shared with their sibling. One daughter said to me, "I don't want him to stop living. I don't want to go on with my life without him being part of it and growing along with me. I don't want to leave him behind. I need his caring and sharing."

How would we live? How would we manage? Nothing could ever replace what we have lost. Since my son's death, I don't make long-range plans anymore or take anything for granted. I live each day as it unfolds, for I have learned that everything I know or have known can be shattered in an instant. We did seek help in different ways, through counseling, writing and group therapy. As a result of our tragedy, our family is closer than they have ever been. Any anger or frustration we harbored about one another has disappeared because of its comparative triviality. We've shared feelings never before expressed and emphasize our love for each other, over and over again. This we will do forever more.

## Concerning Siblings

It's been said that when a child's brother or sister dies, actually three people are lost: the sibling and both parents. The sibling also loses a friend, playmate, confidant, role model, and lifelong companion. For the parents, the loss of a child is often so traumatic that they have little left to give to the surviving children. Yet the surviving sibling has fears, needs, and anxieties that must be explored and addressed if the child is to avoid negative long term consequences. Listed here are normal feelings siblings might have concerning the loss along with some suggestions on what to do to encourage their expression.

### Normal Thoughts

"Did I cause the death?" "Will the rest of my family die?" "Who will take care of me now?" "I'm all alone now." "Half of me died." "I'm different from all the other kids." "I'm not a child anymore." "I feel left out." "Things will never be the same again." "No one cares about my grief, only about my parent's grief." "I can't cry because it will make my parents more upset." "I feel guilty to be happy or to laugh." "Why wasn't it me?" "will I die young, too?" "I made it happen by wishing him dead!" "If I act like my sibling, maybe my parents will feel better." "Maybe my parents would love me more if I died!"

### Normal Feelings

Impatient and angry at the world. Resentful over the attention the parents are getting. Resentment over the attention they are not getting. Resentment over having to do more around the home. Fearful of having to replace the sibling. Guilt for feeling relieved over the death after a long illness. Guilt over all the "bad" thoughts, words, and fights with the deceased.

### How To Help

- The bereaved parents should constantly remind themselves to be sensitive to the feelings of the surviving children.
- The parents should strive to maintain as much of a normal routine as possible for the survivors.

- The parents should encourage grieving, openness, and the expression of feelings in the children by grieving openly and expressively in front of them.
  - Reassure them that they are not going to die, too.
  - Reassure them that they are loved, wanted, and okay.
  - Reassure them that they did not cause the death in any way.
  - Give lots of physical reassurance in the way of touching and hugs.
  - Contact the teacher/teachers or school counselors.
  - Ask them what and how they would like the school to be told.
  - Prepare them for questions and remarks they can expect at school.
  - Encourage them to resume their normal activities at their own pace.
  - Remember the sibling's birthday and anniversary of the death.
  - Remember the sibling at special family gatherings and functions.
  - Don't be afraid to talk about the child that died.
  - Talk about all the qualities of the child that died- positive and negative.
  - Talk about the differences between the siblings- good and bad.
  - Don't promise them a replacement sibling with talks of having another child.
  - Remember: surviving siblings cannot become, or replace, the deceased brother or sister.

Editor Note: The following article was written to help grandparents, but I have found these useful ideas really can help any family member or friend with their own grief while also helping you in your grief.

## Helping a Grandparent Who Is Grieving



When a grandchild dies, the grandparent often mourns the death on many levels. The grandparent probably loved the child dearly and may have been very close to him or her. The death has created a hole in the grandparent's life that cannot be filled by anyone else.

Grandparents who were not close to the child who died, perhaps because they lived far away, may instead mourn the loss of a relationship they never had.

Grieving grandparents are also faced with witnessing their child-the parent of the child who died-mourn the death. A parent's love for a child is perhaps the strongest of all human bonds. For the parents of the child who died, the pain of grief may seem intolerable. For the grandparents, watching their own child suffer so and feeling powerless to take away the hurt can feel almost as intolerable.

Young people aren't supposed to die. The death violates the natural order of life and seems terribly unfair. For grandparents, who may have lived long, rich lives already, the struggle to understand the death may bring about feelings of guilt. "Why didn't God take me, instead?" the grandparent may ask himself. "Why couldn't it have been me?"

Such feelings are both normal and necessary. You can help by encouraging the grandparent to talk about them.

Respect faith and spirituality. Many people develop strong commitments to faith and spirituality as they get older. If you allow them, grieving grandparents will "teach you" about the role of faith and spirituality in their lives. Encourage them to express their faith if doing so helps them heal in grief.

Sometimes, however, faith can naturally complicate healing. The grandparent may feel angry at God for "taking" the grandchild. He then may feel guilty about his anger, because, he may reason, God is not to be questioned. Or the grandparent may struggle with feelings of doubt about God's plan or the afterlife.

Talking with a pastor may help the grandparent, as long as the pastor allows the grandparent to honestly express her feelings of anger, guilt and sadness. No one should tell a grandparent that she shouldn't grieve because the child has gone to heaven; mourning and having faith are not mutually exclusive.

Listen with your heart. You can begin to help by simply listening. Your physical presence and desire to listen without judging are critical helping tools. Don't worry so much about what you will say. Just concentrate on the words that are being shared with you.

The grieving grandparent may want to share the same story about the death over and over again. It's as if talking about the death makes it a little more bearable each time. Listen attentively. Realize that this repetition is part of the grandparent's healing process. Simply listen and try to understand.

Sometimes grandparents, especially grandfathers, don't want to talk about the death. They may have been raised to believe that talking about feelings is frivolous or selfish or unmanly. It's OK; they don't have to talk. Simply spending time with them demonstrates your love and concern.

Be compassionate. Give the grandparent permission to express her feelings without fear of criticism. Learn from the grandparent; don't instruct or set expectations about she should respond. Never say, "I know just how you feel." You don't. Think about your helper role as someone who "walks with" not "behind" or "in front of" the grieving grandparent.

Allow the grandparent to experience all the hurt, sorrow and pain that he is feeling at the time. Enter into his feelings, but never try to take them away. And recognize that tears are a natural and appropriate expression of the pain associated with the death.

Avoid clichés. Words, particularly clichés, can be extremely painful for a grieving grandparent. Clichés are trite comments often intended to provide simple solutions to difficult realities. Grandparents are often told, "God needed another angel in heaven" or "Don't worry, John and Susie (can) have another child" or "You have to be strong for your child." Comments like these are not constructive. Instead, they hurt because they diminish the very real and very painful loss of a unique child.

Offer practical help. Preparing food, washing clothes, and cleaning the house are just a few of the practical ways of showing you care. And, just as with your presence, this support is needed at the time of the death as well as in the weeks and months ahead.

Write a personal note. Sympathy cards express your concern, but there is no substitute for your personal written words. What do you say? Share a favorite memory of the child who died. Relate the special qualities that you valued in him or her. These words will be a loving gift to

the grandparent, words that will be reread and remembered always.

Use the name of the child who died in your personal note and in talking to the grandparent. Hearing that name can be comforting, and it confirms that you have not forgotten this important child whom the grandparent loved and misses so much.

Be aware of holidays and other significant days. The grandparent may have a difficult time during special occasions like holidays and other significant days, such as the child's birthday and the anniversary of the child's death. These events emphasize the child's absence. Respect this pain as a natural extension of the grief process.

These are appropriate times to visit the grandparents or write a note or simply give them a quick phone call. Your ongoing support will be appreciated and healing.

"When a grandchild dies, grandparents grieve twice. They mourn the loss of the child and they feel the pain of their own child's suffering. Sometimes we forget about the grandparents when a child dies. You can help by not forgetting, by offering the grandparents your love, support and presence in the weeks and months to come."

During my "first" year, I expected that spring would cheer me up, and make me feel lots better. How surprised and frustrated I was when, on one of those truly magnificent spring days as life seems to burst forth everywhere, I was "in the pits." When a friend said to me, "Doesn't a day like this really lift your spirits and make you feel better?" I had to reply honestly that I was having a really bad day – that the sense of loss and emptiness was greatly intensified.

Gradually, I began to realize that my

expectations for spring were unrealistically high. I had looked forward to spring with the wrong kind of hope. When we are newly bereaved, we are constantly looking for something to take away the pain and make our lives all right again. Unfortunately, there is no magical event or moment when this takes place. It does happen, but only with time and the grief work which we all must do before we can be healed.

The coming of spring cannot make everything okay again. What it can do, however, is remind us that regardless of what happens in our lives, nature's process will continue, and that can offer us hope.

I am looking forward to spring this year. I welcome the sun's warmth, the return of the birds from their winter in the south, and forsythia, the daffodils and the greening of the world. Know that someday you will once again welcome spring. Be gentle and patient with yourself and with nature. Don't expect too much. Be ready to let a little of the hope that spring can offer into your heart.

## Easter Means Forever

Today I want to write a few lines about Easter and life after death, a subject of profound interest to everyone, young and old. At Easter we commemorate the supreme mystery of life; we reaffirm the glorious hope that life is eternal. An immortal parable to me is the most satisfying illustration on the subject of life after death. It has to do with a baby in a pre-natal state. The baby is nestled up under his mother's heart, well fed and happy. He likes it there. Suppose, then, that somebody comes to the baby and tells him, "You're not going to stay here. You're going to be born," and he learns that being born means he would leave this warm, secure place. That would not be "being born" to him. That would be "dying," for dying is considered an end. And the baby would say, "I don't want to die out of this place. I like it here. I'm warm, I feel love all around me, I'm happy and content. Just leave me alone. I don't want to leave this nice place."

But there comes a day when he is born ... or looking at it from his angle ... when he dies out of that place and is born into our world.

What happens to him? The first thing, he

feels soft, tender, loving hands gently holding him. He looks up into a wonderful face that is full of love, and loving eyes are shining down at him. Then as he grows he has the fascinating experiences of childhood and young manhood, and the future is before him. He feels strong. It is good to be alive. He marries and has children. He becomes middle-aged, is creative and happy, and life is good; indeed the world is good. He loves it.

Then the years begin to add up. His hair becomes white and his step a bit feeble. And he knows he has to die, to leave all this and go away into another place, some uncertain place that is mysterious to him.

And once again he protests, "I don't want to die! I like it here. I love to feel the warmth of the sun on my face, the softness of rain, the bite of snow. I love to see great blue-shrouded mountains shouldering out the sky. I love to watch the ocean washing upon soft shores of sand. I love to be with my family and friends. Life is good. I don't want to leave here." But, as it happens to all humanity, one day he does die to this world.

What happens then? Does God all of a sudden change in nature? That doesn't make sense. Isn't it reasonable to believe that the first thing man will feel is the touch of great, loving hands, that he will look up into a face that is infinitely loving, and he will look around him wonderingly, and his breath will be taken away by the beauties that he sees? All tears will be wiped from his eyes and he will ask, "Why was I so afraid of this thing called death, when as I now see, it is life more wonderful than ever before?" And he will be forever alive.

## "Let's Pray for the Baby"

As was stated by a writer, it used to be that the mother was never allowed the "luxury" of grieving. As my child was born, I was placed under general anesthesia, and not even told what gender my baby was. My husband was in the army, out on a field problem; I was placed in the GYN ward with the hysterectomies, and by the time I came home from the hospital, all reminders of my preparations for that baby were removed.

I grieved in brief spurts, off and on, for the next ten years. One evening as my oldest son (who was 12 at the time) and I were setting the table for dinner, he asked why there was a five year age gap between him and our daughter. I

told Christopher the story, even the fact that I never even knew the sex of his younger sibling.

Christopher turned to our china closet and retrieved our family Blessing Cup that we use for special paraliturgies, and said, "Let's pray for the baby. We also have to name our baby. Let's name the baby Stacy, because that could be a boy or a girl's name." That night, our family prayed together, and my daughter, three sons, and husband gathered around me like a warm winter quilt, allowing me to weep for the first time.

I weep now and then, knowing the emptiness will never go away, but now I weep for Stacy, not the stillborn baby". Since I have named Stacy, I see a face; gender is not important, but I weep for lost potential and lost love that is tangible. Because I know that feeling of loss will never leave me, I want the opportunity to cry with other parents through your bimonthly newsletter. The time spent in grief can be so healing!

## For Grandparents...



In many families, the relationships between grandparents and grandchildren are every bit as profound as those between parents and their children. The death of a grandchild also ranks high on the scale of human grief – but it is rarely acknowledged. There are few books or support groups addressing the grief of grandparents, and bereavement counselors who specialize in this kind of grief are rare. Grandparents are usually left to cope as best they can.

When a grandchild dies, the anguish of grandparents is doubled. Their grief for a son or daughter suffering this tragic loss only compounds their pain at the loss of a beloved grandchild. Grandparents who outlast a grandchild struggle with a death that seems out of order; they may cope with survival guilt, perhaps wondering why they couldn't have died instead. Moreover, a grandchild's death chips away at a grandparent's assumed legacy. Most of us hope to make a mark in the world, and the achievements of our children and grandchildren are a part of that dream. When one dies prematurely, that loss resonates through the generations, and like the bell in John Donne's poem – "it tolls for thee."
