Father's Day Reflections

In the past, fatherhood was something I took for granted. Fatherhood was something I did with the scraps of time left over after my work and recreation. Fatherhood was "providing" for my family. This is the job description for a father. This was all anyone should expect from a man.

We who have lost a child know this lie for what it is. We who believed in it know we deceived ourselves. Our child has died. Nothing in this life matches the incredible suffering we experience. Nothing in this life communicated God's love as perfectly as the smile of our beloved one. And now our beloved one is gone

It has been two years this Father's Day since my 6-year-old son, John, died suddenly after a van backed over him as he rode his "big wheel" down the sidewalk near our home. The weeks and months following his death were times of tormented soul searching.

Why had I not spent more time with him? Why had I not been more loving toward his mother and sister? At bedtime the night before he died he asked me to read one more book. He wanted me to lie next to him one last time until he fell asleep. I refused. Now I know, as many of you do, that second chances don't always come. Death is a harsh teacher, especially on this day of remembrance. On this day, although I have another child who honors me, in some ways I feel like a man without a country. I ache for the Father's Day past when I was whole and did not know it.

Unbeknownst to me, fatherhood was growing up to me. It was trying to teach me to give beyond my own strength. But I was an imperfect student. Death has shown me what I should have known all along. Fatherhood is God's greatest gift to a man. Death has taught me to love unselfishly, and to give without resentment. Yet, even still, I find old behavior patterns trying to assert themselves. I find myself filling my evenings with classes, meetings, and activities, and neglecting my family just as before. But there is hope. Sometimes in the middle of some petty conflict with my wife or daughter, I wake up and ask myself, "Has John's

death taught me nothing? Was it without meaning? Instead of trying to save the world, should I not save my marriage and family from the horror we have gone through?" Death is the ultimate wake-up call to what is truly important. One death is enough for me.

On this Father's Day, in our sorrow, hopefully we can say we have learned from the most terrible teacher. Hopefully we are more complete human beings. More generous with ourselves. Better lovers. Better husbands. Better fathers.

Father's Day It Will Never Be the Same



Our precious daughter and only child, Jill Kathleen, passed away on September 3, 1990 from a brain stem tumor. She was less than three months over six years old. I think back to my own father's Father's Days. It's pretty hard to remember what we did. Maybe we went fishing or to a baseball game. I know I always told my dad I loved him, because I did. We probably always had a good dinner that day too, a favorite of Dad's no doubt. To me somehow Father's Day always meant at least part of the day devoted to house or yard work.

When Jill came into my life, it was the greatest thing that ever happened to me and when she left it, it was the worst that ever happened. Therefore, Father's Day will never be the same. I keep diaries and for Jill's last year and the years after, there are some very painful entries. But, before she passed on there are some interesting entries. When she was four, I noted that I got a card from her. I have it stashed away someplace. When she was five, she gave me a card but hid my present and couldn't remember where she put it. We went to a church picnic that year, and Jill had her "first date" with a neighbor boy from up the street. I played Monopoly with her in the evening; she won! I put her to bed and read her a bedtime story.

When she was six she was sick, but could still get around pretty well. We made a big deal of the day. She gave me a "rainbow" colored, golf size umbrella for a present. I still have it because it's now very special to me. I'd rather get wet than see that umbrella wrecked on a windy, rainy day.

Since Jill is gone, Father's Days have been different. For the first three years our friends and relatives tried to console me as best they could on this day. In 1992 I wrote in my diary, "I'm not a Dad without you, Jill." Now I have to correct myself- I

was a Dad and always will be one except that I had to bury my daughter. It's not the way it should be, but it's the way it is, and I can't change it. God, how I wish I could.

I don't cry as much anymore, but the feeling that will trigger the tears are just under the surface waiting for the right emotional circumstances.

Dads, you have every right to be sad, depressed, and heart broken on Father's Day, because you have lost a son or daughter who can never be replaced. I know because I'm one of you. If you try to work through grief (it is hard work) and not run away from it or stuff it somewhere, your pain will lessen as time goes by. The scar you have from the loss, however, will remain forever. The day will never be the same again, but you can make it different. Life isn't easy, and it isn't fair. But you can make it bearable by treasuring the memories of your daughter or son.

Some of you, unfortunately have lost more than one, but even one is too many. Treasure also the memorabilia of your daughter or son no matter how long they lived.

Cry if you feel like it. I feel better after I do, because it makes me feel I'm not losing touch with her. Do whatever works for you. Think of how your son or daughter whom you loved and who loved you would want you to feel on Father's Day. Then plan and do something that will make you feel just a little bit better and dedicate it to your daughter's or son's memory. It's worked for me.

This concept promotes a sense of failure and concern. In reality, grief demands the time it needs. Healing requires active participation in grieving.

- That I must create a "new normal" for myself.
- That my daughter's love of life continues to give me the strength to go on.
- That I must re-invest the energy I gave to my child into something/someone else.

- That I will always have tears on my heart.
- That it is so important to keep my daughter's name and memory alive. That only in the articulation of grief does it diminish.
- That making new traditions helps.
- How the soft glow of a candle helps to warm my heart again and bring my daughter near.
- That it doesn't matter how our children died, just that they have.
- That over time, the cemetery brings peace and solitude ... not just tears.
- How the pain and grief I feel one day isn't necessarily the way I will feel the next day.
- That some of the things I thought I'd never do again since my daughter died - I have.
- That I can laugh again and not feel guilty.
- That along with all the pain and despair, joy and happiness have I found a place in my life again.
- People who have not lost a child can't possibly understand what I went through.
- That not only does one lose a child, but they can also lose their belief system, some family members and some friends in the process.
- Our society is deficient in death education and really doesn't know how to respond to the grieving person.
- Some people want to see and be around "happy" people and only have so much to give for those who are grieving.
- Everyone grieves differently, and there is no "right" or "wrong" way to grieve.
- There is no time frame for "getting on with your life" after the death of your child.
- Strangers can give more than some relatives. You don't always have until tomorrow.
- The world does not stop when your child dies.
- Being among nature helps to bring some softness to my heart and brings my daughter closer to me.
- That as unbelievable as it is to me, I have come to reconcile my daughter's death. A "settling" has taken place within myself.
- You don't have to have money to be rich.
- A broken heart will mend ... almost.

- We are all connected and need each other in such a special way.
- Many times we are touching lives and helping each other in time and space that we don't even realize.
- The support of family and friends is invaluable.
- The phone becomes an object of anxiety sometimes. (Child's death notified by phone.)
- That "normalizing" the sense of being totally insane is helpful.
- There may be difficulty when people say we are "coping so well."
- After three years, I don't want to talk about the loss of my son a lot, although he is rarely absent from my consciousness.
- It may help to focus on the very small things, because you will not be able to make sense of the larger picture.
- To attempt to feel comfort in the warmth or scent of a cup of hot tea in my hands, the smell of a flower, the proximity of someone who cared.
- The daily searing pain gets less raw, and sometimes I can have moments of joy.
- To watch the sunset every day.
- My son will always be alive as long as I am also alive.
- I can smile when I remember him.
- I had to go with my feelings and trust in our love.
- It takes years of baby-stepping and falling.
- To be humble, grateful and a little more selfish, aware, honest and looking forward to my life, rather than living my son's death.
- What I would give for just ONE more day!
- It feels awfully good typing this into the computer.

Hope

I feel we must have hope to continue with our lives and I know as a bereaved parent we sometimes lose hope. Right now some of you may not be aware of your hope, but it's there -- just a glimmer, perhaps, but, because you have gone to the trouble to get to the meetings there is hope. You may look to those of us who have some distance from our grief. They did not hurt any less over the death of their children than you hurt over the death of your child, yet they have survived and are productive members of society. Their pleasantness and gentleness and interest in life and their concern for OUR pain can surely be a symbol of hope for the rest of us.

I can look back over my own grief experience and see that I, thankfully, never lost hope for very long. At times I thought I surely would not survive. Times I didn't want to survive, it would be easier not to -- but the thing that inspired me to go on was that I believe my son lives somewhere and I want to see him again. This to me means a life of service to others.

It's been three years and seven months now and sometimes the reality of his death overwhelms me and momentarily I am despondent but it's easier now for me to pull out of depression and I know the things I must do to keep going -- I must find some project to help continue the building of my self-confidence and self-esteem. I keep going because I have hope.

There is one thing that Compassionate Friends can't do for you. We can't grieve for you! That is your job and somehow you have to find some way to get through the stages as they come. It's lonely and it's hard but we are here to help because we understand, and we care, and hopefully you may find hope in the way that we have handled our grief.

Five Things A Firefighter/Medic Wants You To Know

Moms and Dads, can I talk to you for a minute? I was too busy during the emergency, and afterward -- well, you both had more important matters to attend to. It doesn't matter whether you live in the Pacific Northwest or Florida, Maine or Kansas City. If your child was taken from you suddenly, there was probably someone like me in attendance who fights fire and delivers medical aid for a living. Chances are they've struggled with the same feelings I struggle with. Here are five things I'd like to tell you. It's my hope that something I say will make your struggle through grief a little easier to manage.

#1- Your Child Was Not "Just-Another Patient"

Perhaps you assume that because I've seen thousands of patients in my career, I wouldn't remember your son or daughter. Not true! Only the loss of a fellow firefighter affects us more profoundly than a child's death. When I lose a child in the line of duty, I don't leave the experience at the station.

Your child's face comes home with me. I see him when I'm fishing, working in my garage, or just drifting off to sleep. I can still recall vividly the hour

I spent with a little girl from a car accident almost fourteen years ago. She has a permanent place in my memory, just like your little one.

(It's the inability to come to terms with these memories that drives many a firefighter from his or her career. Those of us who are old-timers in emergency medicine have learned to deal with the tragic cruelties of life we must face. Some exercise vigorously. Others, like me, write about our experiences. Sadly, there are some who are unable to cope with the pain and turn to drugs or alcohol.)

#2 - I Did More Than Provide Medical Care—

When I am fighting to save a child, I talk to them. It doesn't make any difference whether they're responding or not. I reassure and attempt to comfort them. If they're awake and very young, I give them a stuffed animal to hold. I do one other thing. I tell them that their mom and dad love them very much. I do this because several years ago, a mother told me "I would've given anything to tell my son I loved him just one last time." Since then, I try to tell every child that you, their parents, love them very much.

#3 - I Struggle With Feelings of Failure and Inadequacy

When a firefighter/paramedic loses a child, he or she may struggle with personal feelings of failure. So often we repeatedly ask ourselves "what if" questions. "What if I'd been at a closer station? What if I'd arrived five minutes sooner? What if I'd tried another course of treatment?" It's these feelings of inadequacy that often keep a medic from approaching the parents of his patient. If a firefighter seems to be avoiding eye contact, he likely is not only struggling with his emotions, but possibly struggling with the feeling that he has failed. It's a common occurrence, despite the fact the medic may have performed flawlessly.

#4 - I Grieve With You

Macho as we'd like to portray ourselves, we are by nature a group of men and women sincerely touched by the sorrow and suffering of others. That's one of the reasons we are drawn to the fire service in the first place. We have a deep, burning drive to make a difference, to alter tragedy in the making if we possibly can. Maybe it's because we feel we have an image to uphold. Whatever the reason, we firefighters tend to be good at holding our grief in check until we are alone. We present a tough-as-steel facade and inevitably do our crying in the station's hose tower or the compressor room where no one can hear us.

#5 - I'm Available to Answer Questions

So often there are procedures or treatments you may not understand. They are almost always done for a very good reason, and with your child's best interest in mind. Almost without exception, the firefighters and medics who fought to save your child would be happy to answer any questions you may have. We also need to be informed when we unknowingly make comments that hurt or offend.

I won't make the mistake of telling you I know how you feel. I can try to imagine your pain, but I'm sure I could never know how it really feels unless I'd lost one of my children. I can tell you that I, and all my fellow fighters, do care. It is the chance that we will save the next victim of tragedy that keeps us doing what we're doing in the face of so much sorrow. We wish for you strength and peace on your journey.

Finding Peace in Honoring Our Daughter

I love hearing the stories behind the names that we each have chosen for our sweet babies. I am often struck at how much time and care is taken to choose just the right name for any child, although for some it seems to take on greater significance when you learn that your child will not have a lifetime with their name.

Several years ago I had a discussion with others after one parent shared their thought of not "wasting" this special name that meant so much to the family on a baby who would die. It is such a difficult situation. I remember myself being shocked at first at how honest a thing that was to share. I was also taken aback a little, as if the act of sharing this thought aloud somehow translated into cheating my child out of something. I remember feeling ashamed to admit that I felt the very same thing.

I too had those secret thoughts about giving our baby girl the name Rowan. I had wanted that name for my daughter for as far back as I could remember; before I ever met my husband. For me it was a beautiful and unique name, especially in the United States, where it is just not as popular as in other countries.

Ultimately for us, there was hardly any wavering when naming her. I felt it would be unfair to deprive her of something that meant so much to us, and we named her the moment she arrived. We didn't know she was a girl, or about her diagnosis - but we knew something would be wrong on the day that she was born.

I remember when we were filling out the "official" birth forms for social security and such after she was born and it was then that these little thoughts crept into my mind again. Maybe we could save this name for another child. Maybe...

I don't regret having my "chosen" name being given to someone who lived only a day... of course I wanted so much to have her live a long life with her beautiful name. I imagined her with auburn hair telling everyone that her name means "little redhead" in the old Irish. I thought it would be a strong name for a woman to have, most likely not shortened by a nickname as she grew up.

In retrospect, I do feel that I have honored her by giving her the name we had chosen. I can say now, that if we had given her another name, I would have felt we had in some way devalued and disrespected her. The beautiful daughter that has arrived after her could never have been named Rowan. Today I can look back and truly say it is an

honor to have my firstborn bear the name that I had dreamt about giving a child for so long. And the irony, I guess, is that she does have her name for a lifetime, it just is not her lifetime - but ours. Her name is part of the legacy that is my family, and hopefully I can instill in everyone how wonderful it is to continue to talk openly about Rowan, so that we may never forget her.

My daughter would be turning 6 this year. I have found joy in hearing her name still spoken in our home and among our friends, and more recently among her younger siblings. For me, her name is so very special, probably even more so now because hearing it spoken proves her spirit and her memory are alive in us.

Intimacy

We need to give ourselves permission to accept our level of sexual needs. This aspect of our life needs to heal as well, and pressuring ourselves or feeling guilty is not helpful.

Grief Tips For Family & Friends

- * Acknowledge, do not avoid ... The difficult reality that has happened by your word or presence.
 - * Serve as a willing "sponge" ... And listen to the story of pain over and over, until the storyteller no longer needs to hear it.
 - * Validate what the grieving are saying ... Without trying to correct them. Without using cliches.
 - * Accept grieving people where they are ... While remembering there is no standard timetable of grief.
 - * Offer specific ways to help ... Without using generalizing phrases like "Call if I can be of help."
 - * Listen to their questions ... Without giving any of your answers. Even though you want to "band-aid" them.
 - * Show tender care and encouragement... When they are heavy of heart, and don't leave because they're "not fixed yet."
 - * Share your memories of their loved one ... In stories, pictures, and "I remember when's" so they know you have not forgotten.
 - * Realize that companioning the grieving ... Can drain all of your energies to a deep low, unless you meaningfully keep yourself fed.

Brothers and Sisters

My bear Brother Billy was 6'5" and 230 pounds and 19. He shall forever be 19. I was 22 and suppose to meet him that night. I can't really remember the weather in December of 1972, except that it was cold enough to make moisture hard. Thirty years ago and what happened is just yesterday. So my sibling friends what does one think 10,950 days after their brother or sister dies? I will tell you what it was like for me.

I remember a stunning, debilitating, overwhelming guilt that I had been less than always kind to my younger brother. Perfection in the execution of brotherly love was not always present. Billy's dying eliminated any chance for me to say that I was sorry for being less than an ideal sibling. It hurt that I was suppose to go to the baseball all-star game with him but canceled at the last minute and I have regretted that for 30 years. Odd what takes on great significance after death but not before? I remember Billy and I struggling in life like so many other young souls. Just trying to find their way and do the best they can. Simple survival can be such a challenging chore. Why couldn't I be there for him when he needed me? We got close our last couple of years but there is still a void where we went our own ways and ...maybe if I...should I have...could I have...why didn't I, what if...

Why did this have to happen to him and not me? He was the good one, the innocent one, the big one, and the fun one. If only I had cared more, been smarter, put forward more effort to

understand his life then maybe things would have been different, what if...

I remember getting that phone call from my sister and her asking "are you standing or sitting?" "Standing," I replied. A trembling voice that immediately conveyed the "I know something is wrong" feeling. From miles away through a lifeless wire that would transmit a message that changed the future forever I heard, "I suggest you sit down!" and "Billy is dead!" It was good I had sat down as numbness seized my heart and Soul. My brother was gone in an instant. Billy was now a memory.

Not knowing how your sister or brother died, the age, the circumstances, I don't really know precisely how you feel but I have a pretty good idea. I have often wondered if it is better to go quick or to have time to consider death. I still don't know the answer to that one and I'm not sure if it even really matters. Death equals gone and what more is there to say. It seems talking about my brother Billy does rekindle fond memories of laughter and good times. Time has nurtured an ability to put any I stuff like the funeral in a place I never have to go.

Occasionally I will encounter a stranger and in our conversation we learn we both have an unspeakable loss of a brother or sister. It always somehow feels good to identify with a veteran of secret grief. We brothers and sisters have gotten quite good at keeping our sadness well below the surface of casual observation. Misery does not love company but it does crave and cling to compassion from someone that actually understands. An encounter with a fellow traveler that doesn't say a lot but with a simple nod of the head expresses knowledge that has been earned. The "I know what you mean" glance directed from their so sad and sometimes slightly moist eyes to another soul tuned into their heartbreaking loss through experience.

Thirty years ago and my yesterday shows a 22-year-old sweeping off the dusting of night snow from a porch that doesn't need it, to keep busy and not have to be inside with all the crying. Thirty years and I still remember the bizarre. There was the casket showroom that held the Cadillac's and Ford's and Chevy's of coffins but it all seemed too weird to care at all. Then someone got upset that a dear friend of Billy's wanted to put one of those funny cigarettes in with him for all eternity. The rest felt it was endearing so it stayed. We hurt for all of his young friends that seemed so lost, shaken

by being thrust into an insane world of reality and death before their preparation was complete. Friends mean so very much and seem to be the first to be forgotten.

We hurt so much because we love so much. I can admit that today because I am old. I wished I had done it back then. One day, a long time ago, I asked forgiveness for all my mistakes. One day long ago I said goodbye to my brother Billy and all my regrets. I said I was sorry for having to let him go but I just couldn't stand the unrelenting, horrendous heartache and the "what ifs..." I had to let go, not of Billy, but of the pain and the negative emotions that kept that tortuous ache alive. So 10,950 days later I have survived and I am the better for having known a little big brother named Billy.

Anniversary Reaction

Every year there is an anniversary of your child's death, and every year you react to it. It doesn't make any difference if it's the first or the twenty-first. You know the date is approaching. Strangely, sometimes you will be deeply disturbed for weeks before the actual date. Other times the fact that an anniversary is nearing won't seem to bother you much at all. The only thing consistent in the anniversary reaction is that you WILL react.

For years after Arthur was killed, I would begin my anniversary reaction around Easter time. Easter Sunday was the last "holiday" that we were together as a complete family. For many years Easter Sunday was the starting date for reliving that terrible Friday and the days following. For a number of years, I experienced painful anniversary reactions, but generally, the farther I get from Arthur's death date, the less painful it is.

But circumstances or events can make it painful, even years later. For example, on the 11th anniversary, I was also grieving the death of my granddaughter. At that time Emily hadn't been dead a year yet. I saw the pain my daughter was experiencing and because I couldn't "kiss it and make it better" for MY child, I hurt even more.

There will be times when the coming of an anniversary will fill you with fear and pain. Other years it will come with just a ripple in your heart. Some years will be very hard, other years won't be.

Accept that as normal. Know that however you feel is right for you. Be kind to yourself you may need a lot of care at that time. For the times that you don't hurt deeply, be thankful that some of the pain is gone. The time will come when you no longer hurt because X number of years ago your child died. Be glad of that.

What won't go away until you die will be the lack of history continuing after his/her death date. You will be very aware that your child isn't graduating from high school, or being married, or having your grandchildren, and that will hurt. There will always be the questions, what would she/he look like? What would she/he be doing now? These thoughts and questions will be forever unanswered.

You will always react to your child's death date, because you will always love your child, and she/he will always be in your heart and mind.

But then, the anniversary will be over and life will take on sunshine again. However old your child was when she/he died is the mental picture you will have of her/him. And, oh what a beautiful picture it is.

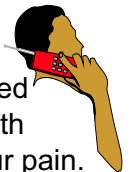
