Choose Now.**" While we had no choice in becoming a bereaved parent, grandparent, or sibling, we must choose how to go on from here. This month's topic will start with different ideas that other bereaved parents have used to find ways to go on with their lives after suffering this terrible loss. Sometimes we have to actually stop and analyze what we can do to help ourselves instead of just spinning our wheels like a hamster in a cage.

The more we look for options out of the pain, the easier it will be to focus on the small steps we take to regain some control over our lives. We can choose to look for ways to honor our child's life instead of focusing on the death. We can choose to get up and start each day even though we would rather pull the covers over our heads and block out the world. We can decide we must recognize the cold hard truth... our child has died. We have not. We have been left to face this harsh reality and to make what we can with the rest of our lives. We can choose to go on. We can choose to start now. We can choose to reach out to another bereaved parent. We can choose to start rebuilding with each others help and encouragement. Like our motto says, we need not walk alone, we are the Compassionate Friends. Come join us and share what has helped you in your grief.

### In the Beginning...

Your child has just died. As a newly bereaved parent you have experienced the most devastating life-changing event. Your whole world has been shattered and you are in a new world now. You will be re-learning how to survive when at times you won't even want to survive.

The only hope I can give you is that we in TCF, have survived and we are here to help you. It won't be easy but keep in mind, if you hadn't loved so much you wouldn't hurt so much now.

"How long will it last?" is probably the first question we hear from ones like you new to grief. It is a very important question to us at the beginning. Professionals have tried to place timetables based on their studies, and you will hear "two years" quoted, but those of us who have been down the road a number of years will tell you that you will not "get over" the death of your child in two years. You probably never will "get over" his or her death, but you will learn to live with the fact of it and rejoin life and lead a normal life again; it will just be different from before.

There is no timetable on grief. Some work through the process sooner than others but for us who are bereaved because our child died, grief is longer and more devastating than grief from any other death in our lives.

We operate on our own individual timetable; we cannot judge our progress or lack of it by anyone else.

Grief is a process, a moving through. Sometimes we go forward, but sometimes we get "stuck" for a while, but keep in mind it is a process and eventually you will move through it. Most of us do experience shock and denial or disbelief first. We can't believe it has happened; there must be a mistake. This happens to other people, not us. That shock is so tremendous that it affects us physically as well as psychologically. It is marked by a lowering of blood pressure, coldness of the skin, rapid heartbeat, and an acute sense of terror.

That shock insulates us and allows us to go through our duties and do things at this time that we never could have done otherwise. I praise the shock because it keeps us from dying too. That shock allows some of us to carry on with grace and skill during the days surrounding the death and the funeral. That same shock knocks some of us into merciful oblivion and we don't remember a thing during that time. We are all individuals and we react differently during grief but there are common reactions we all share. This is why you will find very quickly that the only one who really understands what you are going through is another bereaved parent.

Anger may come at any time. It is a natural, normal reaction; don't be afraid or ashamed of it. Know it is okay, you won't always feel this way. There is nothing wrong with you for feeling this way-most of us feel some anger towards something, even at God, even the child in some instances.

You have been hurt beyond your wildest imaginings. I have described my own anger as rage. Society frowns on anger, so don't expect to always be treated kindly when you display it. But remember, you have a right to be angry. Anger is often unfocused and we sometimes take it out on innocent people. Medical personnel are often the first to receive this anger and funeral directors are next in line. Later that anger can attack anyone who crosses our paths.

It is good to recognize anger and try to focus it, and learn to use it as a tool. Take up social issues, find healthy outlets for it. It is important to do something physical about anger. Hard work and sports are two ways. We've heard many stories of chopping wood, buying dishes at garage sales and breaking them when we need an outlet. Scream in the shower, in your speed boat, or closed up in your car, but get it out. Anger turned inward becomes depression.

With the death of our child everything we ever believed in is shattered. In my own case, I had to struggle for a long time to even figure out what I had believed in; I was so confused. Our egos and our beliefs in ourselves, were badly shaken because, as parents, we truly believed we could protect our child from anything. We were careful, good parents, and now our child is dead. We have failed to keep our child alive and our ego tells us we are a failure! This devastates us; we can no longer believe in ourselves; we feel that obviously we are incapable of doing anything right.

We have no self-confidence, no longer any self-esteem. These are all natural, normal responses to the horror of your child's death. Given time and care these feelings will pass. We will achieve a balance in our personal life again.

Remind yourself to be patient, to be kind to yourself. You are not a failure, you did the very best you could, and you surely would have given your own life to save your child's. You did not fail; life just isn't always fair. These feelings, and others as bizarre, may cause you to think you are going crazy. Ask any bereaved parent of some years and they will all tell you they thought the same thing at some time or point.

You are a changed person now, you will never again be the same as you were before your child died. Someday you will accept that fact. Out of the ashes of grief you can grow, if and when you choose to do so. Look around you to the other bereaved parents; you will find role models and hope in them.

There will be many tears, allow them, they are healing and necessary to survival and recovery.

Many of us suffer from the lack of ability to concentrate. It is a common complaint. We can't think, we can't remember from one minute till the next, and we have no idea what we've read. Be patient; given time and effort you will return to normal.

Hang on to any shred of your sense of humor that you can, even a small chuckle now and then can break your tension and give some relief. It may be a while in coming, but one day you will laugh again. I know you can't believe that now but you will.

You will have a strong need to talk. You will find that you can talk more than one person can listen, so seek out several good friends who will let you talk to them. You will need to tell your child's story over and over again. You will need to talk about the whole life and the death and what you are going through now. Talking is therapeutic. Talk, and talk, and talk, until your story is told.

At night you may go over the events again and again, night after night. This is called obsessional review. Sleep disturbances are not unusual. We either can't sleep or sleep too much.

We suffer guilt, real or imagined. We recall punishments and in turn punish ourselves with them, when at the time, the punishment was probably fair. We remember things we did and things we didn't do. We go through the "if onlys." If only we had or hadn't.

Beware of isolation. We need to be with people, not alone. When we isolate ourselves with no one to talk about our feelings, we become depressed; and isolation plus depression equals suicidal feelings, and that spells real trouble.

We are fatigued, lack motivation, we suffer numerous physical complaints, headaches, stomach disorders, we are either nervous or feel dead inside-many and sundry are our complaints, most of which are normal and to be expected in this time of enormous stress. And always we ask ourselves and others, "Why?" "Why ?" "Why my child?" Simply because life isn't always fair, my friend.

Your world is topsy-turvy now, nothing makes sense, nothing fits-family balance is upset, the numbers are all wrong, there is one too many chairs at the table now, so you choke on your food and think of the empty chair. Grocery shopping is a nightmare because your child's favorite food greets you from the shelves of every aisle.

You don't dare think of the holidays because you know you'll never survive them without your child. Your child's birthday and the memory of all the joy of that day looms like a mountain far too high to climb-some days all you want is for the pain to stop.

Some days you can't get out of bed. Some days you work hard and fast like something possesses you. Every day you cry. You find you are very lonely even in the midst of a crowded shopping mall. You want to scream at the busy, happy people, "Don't you know my child is dead?" How can they go on as if nothing has happened? No matter how many people your are with, you are lonely.

Our members understand; each one of us has had at least one child die. We know what you are going through. We don't pretend to have all the answers, but we want to share this time of your life with you. We want you to know

you are not alone.

### **Choice Points In Your Grief**

We have always had choices in our lives: Should I smile or cry now? Which thumb to suck? Which shoe to lose? Who will be my best friend? Who will be my second best friend? Which to eat first ... dessert or vegetable? Which one to fall in love with? Whom to marry? How many children to have? What will we name them?

And then, one day, we ran out of choices, or so we thought. Our world came to pieces, and the sky grew dark, and the sun went out. But even then, in the darkest moments that we have ever known, there were choices to be made ... even if we did not recognize them. From the moment we learned of the death, there were choices to be made: Should I continue breathing? Who needs to be notified? Which funeral home to use? Burial or cremation? Which clothes, music, readings? Who will do what? Should I continue breathing?

In a world where there are no choices to be made, we are faced with countless choices that are required. Yet there is simply no energy, no brainpower, no motivation to make any of them. We would prefer to lie down and die ...and some of us tried, but it didn't work, and so we got up, dusted ourselves off, got busy, made coffee, tossed in a load of laundry, and began to move forward into grief ... a world filled with choices we did not want to make!

In the early hours, days, weeks, and even months of grief, our choices are pretty basic and limited. We plod through the fog, frozen as icicles or Popsicles, functioning, but not feeling. It is early grief, and fortunately the choices are pretty basic: Should I eat? Should I go to work? Should I pay the bills? Should I keep breathing?

But as grief progresses, our choices begin to become more complex: What should we do with the stuff? What do we do with the room? Should I keep breathing? Should we move, stay married, hide? What do we tell everyone when they ask how we are? Why are we still breathing?

Eventually grief settles down into a routine of sorts ... a new normal for us; and still there are choices to be made: Should we go to a support group? Should I make him/her go with me? How should we memorialize our child, grandchild? How long should we be grieving? Can we move on, get over it, or stay in sadness forever?

And finally, what should we bring with us into our new life? Bitterness? Sadness? Guilt? Joy? Hate? Sorrow? Pain first? Pain always? You will wrestle long and hard, and finally discover the awful truth of grief: your child, your grandchild, your sibling, has died. You have not. You are left among the living, to carve out an existence that has to endure not only the pains of life, but the joys as well. And suddenly, survival isn't enough. If you are to be stuck in life, then you can choose to live again.

We can choose how we wish grief to influence us. We can carry bitterness and anger, or we can choose to remember the light and the love. We rearrange the furniture, change rooms, and sometimes we move. "The Room" becomes a den, a sewing room, a guest room, or perhaps someone else's room. We slowly begin to understand that putting our child's things away does not mean putting him or her out of our life.

This now becomes a fork in the road ... a choice point between grieving forever and learning to live with what you've got instead of what you wanted. You don't have to remember only the awfulness of the death. You can choose to recall the joys, the light your loved one brought, the music of his or her presence in your life: These are the Choice Points in Grief:

 $\checkmark$  You can choose what you remember .

 $\checkmark$  You can choose what you carry with you .

✓ You can choose what you let go.

 $\checkmark$  You can choose to carry hurt, pain, bitterness, and anger .

 $\checkmark$  You can choose to carry joy, love, laughter, and life .

✓ How long are you going to let the death overshadow the life?

✓ Didn't say good-bye? Then say it now, or choose to say, "I love you," now, tonight, and forever.

 $\checkmark$  You don't stop loving someone just because they died .

✓ You can choose whether you remember the death or the life first.

✓ You can look for joy and carry rose-colored glasses, or you can carry the pain and sorrow of the death. Risk it all; don't wait for anything anymore ... just start dancing. Even if there is no light, our memory can light the way. No one can take our memories away. You can toss them away or give them away, but no one can destroy those precious moments of light. They will, last forever.

Love is the size of a sigh Light as a kiss Gentle as a whisper Small as a moment in time

I am glad I bought the ticket. I'm glad I paid the price. I am glad I shared the journey, and I have a memento or two from the ride. Let go of the hurt so there is room for love to grow. Remember the life, not just the death.

I think the truly bereaved are those who have never known love at all. You and I are rich beyond measure because someone loved us and we loved them ... we still do. And for this I am thankful...

Grief isn t a seasonal song. It's a lifetime song, but it doesn't have to be a sad song forever. Our loved ones lived. We loved them. We still do.

### **Taboos and Stigmas**

Excerpts from *A Message of Hope* written by Patricia Harness-Overley

"Stigmas and taboos cause us all a lot of unnecessary heartache. They start from a case of ignorance and fester like an ulcer in society. Left untreated, they bore deep beneath the surface, causing terrible pain, until they are cut away with education and understanding. The stigmas and taboos of suicide are the reason I felt such a sense of shame about the death of my son. I didn't understand this until I began to study the history of suicide.

Being a history buff, I already knew most ancient societies had no fear of suicide. In fact, they saw it as an acceptable way to die. In the Greek and Roman Empires, it was not uncommon for the government to supply a poison hemlock, if one had a good reason and wished death by suicide.

What I didn't know was that in the early Christian era there was an epidemic of suicides. Life was difficult and many believers were eager to enter heaven. The church wanted to put a stop to it. So in the fourth century A.D., Saint Augustine persuaded the church to proclaim suicide a sin on the basis of its being self-murder. This pathetic attempt at suicide prevention didn't do much good.

In the 13th century A.D., Thomas Aquinas convinced the church to declare suicide a mortal sin with eternal damnation as the punishment. This helped a little, but was still not enough, so the church said a victim of suicide couldn't have religious rites or be buried in religious cemeteries.

Then laws were put into effect which offered harsh punishment to anyone who attempted suicide and to the families of the completed suicide. All property belonging to the victim was taken by the government. The body was violated, and often the head would be placed on a pole outside the city gate for all to see. Burial was often at a crossroad where the traffic would pass over the grave. The families were ridiculed with whispers of contempt, disgust, and scorn. They were the butt of cruel jokes. More often than not, they would have to move away from the town which had been their home. The stigma of suicide was disgrace, dishonor, humiliation, and shame. This set up a taboo against talking about suicide, and if one could not talk about it, one could not learn about it.

These attitudes didn't start to change until the 18th century. The laws were slowly changed. Even though there isn't any legal punishment in today's society, the stigmas and taboos are a punishment of their own. People have no idea how much pain they can inflict with some of their ignorant remarks.

One woman told me that my son would rot in hell for his action. Thank goodness most people are not so cruel, but often they didn't have to say it. I could see in their faces and eyes: I could hear it in their voice. This woman was devoutly religious and sincerely believed what she was saying.

Many churches and synagogues are working to change these attitudes. The change is slow because the taboo is so deeply ingrained in us that even professionals, like our religious leaders, teachers, nurses, doctors, and counselors have not received the necessary education about suicide or the grieving process of the family.

When I first saw the statistics on suicide from the American Suicide Foundation and the National

Institute of Mental Health, I found it hard to believe these rates could be so high. The report states that suicide is the second major cause of death among high school and college students, the fourth major cause of death among adults ages 24-34, and that the highest adult suicide rates are found among men over the age of 50. This information was alarming, but then I learned that the rates are based only on the reported deaths and that one-half to three times that number are covered up and never reported.

Many people take their own life in such a manner as to have the death appear to be an accident. An automobile is driven off a cliff or head-on into a tree, an accidental gunshot wound or a hanging that appears to have been an accident proved fatal, or someone steps in front of an oncoming train.

Sometimes the person who finds the body will remove evidence and make the death appear to have been an accidental homicide. Some people will go to all kinds of extremes in an attempt to have the word "suicide" removed from the death certificate. Stigmas and taboos are often the reasons for these cover-ups. How sad it is to face the death of someone we love and then find it necessary to fight demons of ignorance.

After studying the history, I had a better understanding of my feelings and attitudes of other people. Thus, the sting of ignorant remarks became less hurtful."

# The Grief of a Parent Who Has Lost an Infant

To experience the loss of an infant is to grieve for what never was. After all the months of anticipation and preparation, the actual birth of a child brings feelings of hope and fulfillment. Should that child be stillborn, or die hours, days, or even months later, the unrealized dreams become a source of pain for the parents. No parent ever expects to outlive his child; the death of an infant is often the loss of a child unknown even to his or her parents. The expected stages of grief (guilt, disbelief, anger) can have new directions for the parent who has lost an infant. 1. Guilt-- especially if the infant was stillborn or had a birth defect, the mother may feel she has failed as a woman. "Other women have live, normal babies, why can't I?" Should an infant die months after birth, parents find it hard to resolve feelings that it was their fault.

2. No Memories-- parents may only have "souvenirs of occasions" (birth certificates, I.D. bracelet) by which to remember their child. If the infant was older, they may have pictures and a few belongings, but they still feel they hadn't really gotten to know their child.

3. Loneliness in Grief-- it is hard for friends and relatives to share your grief for a child they never knew. If the child is a newborn, they may give the impression that you are grieving unnecessarily over a non-person. They hope that you can "forget this baby" and have another one.

4. Neglected Fathers-- too often the sympathies of professionals and friends are directed mainly toward the mother. It is important to remember that the father had made plans for this baby too. 5. Mothers vs. Fathers-- since the mother had bonded with her child all during pregnancy, her grief may be much deeper that the father who only came to know the child after birth. It may be difficult for the father to understand why his wife's grief is so profound and prolonged. --TCF, Knoxville Hope Chapter, TN

LEFT BEHIND A Mother's Grief, by
